Pentecost 15 - The Cost of Seeking and Finding Freedom

The Exodus story has several survival stories in the various narratives that comprise its description in the biblical text. Exodus 12:1-14 ushers in the tenth plague. This final plague strikes at the heart of Pharaoh. It costs Pharaoh his first-born and the first-born of the families of his people. It seems merciless to us, because the loss of a child is one of the deepest heart-wounds of humanity. The sign that saves the Hebrew children also involves the slaughter of many lambs, one for each Hebrew family. The sacrifice of the lambs provides the blood to mark the lintels and doorposts of Hebrew houses in Egypt. This would save their own first-born. But the first-born of the Egyptians would die. This tragedy temporarily weakens Pharaoh's resolve and he allows the Hebrews to leave Egypt. Later he will change his mind and pursue them.

We read and see the characters and events of this story through twenty-first century lenses. The Exodus has been scrutinised and analysed and the archaeological and literary evidence for it has been sifted through. But the stories of the plagues in Egypt are hard to verify in history. That is, history as we can discern it from events that took place more than 3,000 years ago. However, this narrative and the narrative sequence that follows became the basis of the Passover Story. The Exodus recital in later Jewish liturgies enshrined the Passover, that most poignant of Jewish recollections of their historical traditions, their roots as a nation, and their pilgrimage as a people. Details of history were subsumed in the vast scope and depth of the significance and meaning that the Exodus as a whole acquired for the Jewish people.

Passover comes to us full of resonances of the Last Supper and the Cross. There another Lamb is sacrificed, and the Cross becomes a sign of Salvation, not on lintels and doorposts, but for all of humanity. The sacrifice of a life brings life for all who can see it and take it into their very being and their world view. We do not possess all the details of what happened at the Cross, but we have more than we need to know that a cosmic event took place there that cannot be explained away. We believe that for all those who have ears to hear and eyes to see and faith to believe, it affects the salvation of humanity.

The Master Story of Judaism is the Exodus. The Master Story of Christianity is the Exodus of Christ from death on the Cross to Resurrection into the heart of God. They are both stories about pilgrimage. These master Stories will always intrigue us, inspire us, and provide lasting symbols of identity and destiny. Our own pilgrimage is a participation in the endless search for that which lasts, that which bathes us in a glorious sense of freedom, and that which makes love seem so worthwhile and our life enhanced with meaning.
