Prayer Reflection ANZAC DAY April 25 2016

When I was a small boy I went to Martin Place in Sydney to the Cenotaph there.

I saw the slouch hat for the first time and the men in khaki uniforms. An old lady near me said, "That's our boys". I felt a swell of pride then and I still do. Today we would say boys and girls in an almost inclusive world.

"Greater love has no one than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). These words appear on Anzac boards all across my country. They are words of Christ, but all creeds and colours of humanity can acknowledge them.

This day celebrates a useless war which created heroes on both sides. It is a haunting memory on all sides that fought and for those who remember. Today a global war goes on all the time. Once that happens our minds become the playgrounds of all sorts of evil and consequent reactions that cause harm on the earth.

Let us lift our sights and pray for a better tomorrow and act against the perversion of our souls. This is an endless struggle and this service is a banquet of honour for all those who preceded us and gave their all to keep the flame of hope alive within humanity.
