This poor woman had been bent over for the past 18 years. The fact that Jesus attributes her illness to a demon suggests that her paralysis is probably spiritual as well as physical. The weight of the past can sometimes paralyze us: grief, resentment, nostalgia, and remorse, excessive attachment to things or places. We can become frozen in time and space, like Lot's wife (Gn 17:26). Lord, teach us to

free ourselves from these emotions that paralyze us.

SAINTS:

Bartholomew the Apostle, 24 August . It has long been assumed that Bartholomew is the same as Nathanael though it is not a certainty. The gospels speak of Philip bringing Nathanael to Jesus and calling him an Israelite worthy of the name. He is also present beside the Sea of Galilee at the resurrection. Although he seems initially a somewhat cynical man, he recognises Jesus for who he is and proclaims him as Son of God and King of Israel.

Monica, Mother of Augustine of Hippo, 27 August. Monica was born in North Africa of Christian parents in 332 and she was married to a pagan named Patricius, whom she converted to Christianity. They had three children of whom the most famous was her eldest child, the future Augustine. Indeed, Augustine ascribed his conversion to the example and devotion of his mother: "She never let me out of her prayers that you, O God, might say to the widow's son 'Young man, I tell you arise'" -- which is why the gospel of the widow of Nain is traditionally read today as her memorial. Monica's husband died when she was forty. Her desire had been to be buried alongside him, but this was not to be. She died in Italy, at Ostia, in 387 on her way home to North Africa with her two sons.
